Course Description

CRISP (Clinical Reasoning Integration of Skills & Practice) is a yearlong, longitudinal course for WSU Segment 3 students designed to advance skills in areas common to all specialties. As an integral part of the four-year Highways to Excellence clinical program, students are prepped in various ways to feel confident in completing the Shelf/STEP 2 Exam.

In CRISP, students will have sessions on clinical reasoning, interprofessional health care, continuation of ultrasound curriculum in the clinical setting (including capturing and interpreting images), leadership, career planning, wellness and other topics that help unify the core curriculum. Students will also gain experience reading EKGs and radiographs, palliative care, and working in teams.

Course Goals

This course is designed to enable a WSUSOM student to enter Segment 4 training prepared for continued learning in many areas common to all medical practice and practice in a professional, ethical, socially responsible fashion with the skills and knowledge best introduced in the post-clerkship setting.

Course Objectives

- 1. Demonstrate knowledge and competency in areas common to all specialties of medical practice, including patient care skills, professional practice, professional identity formation, ethics and end of life issues, advanced communication, and lifelong learning.
- 2. Demonstrate implementation of resilience and grit in clinical practice.
- 3. Use appropriate medical applications to support patient care.
- 4. Identify the elements of breaking bad news.
- 5. Reflect on ways to improve interdisciplinary teamwork.
- 6. Identify effective ways to improve time management and organizational skills and identify how you can implement these in your practice.
- 7. Exercise Professionalism Principles during clerkship rotations.
- 8. Apply your knowledge of controlled substance misuse when interacting with patients.
- 9. Using self-reflection, identify and implement activities to support self-care and wellness.
- 10. Recognize EKG patterns in different disease states.
- 11. Capture Ultrasound images of the cardiovascular, abdominal, and musculoskeletal systems.
- 12. Identify abnormalities in radiographs.

Course Structure

The structure of this course is fluid due to the changing environment. A majority will be delivered virtually with the assistance of multiple collaborators across hospital systems as well as faculty, residents, and senior medical students. You will have clerkships at your respective site rotating throughout the year, for the following length of time:

Four-Week Clerkships: Family Medicine, Psychiatry, and Neurology

Six-Week Clerkships: Pediatrics and OB/GYN

12-Week Clerkships: Surgery and Internal Medicine

Course Assignments

<u>CRISP Sessions</u>: You are required to attend all *mandatory* CRISP sessions. There are 16 sessions total, which prepare you for your clerkship(s). You will be excused from clerkship on the afternoon(s) CRISP is held. To view the CRISP schedule, <u>click here.</u>

<u>Clerkship Quizzes/Shelf Exam Prep/Reading Modules/Assignments/Discussion:</u> In each clerkship, you are required to complete assigned quizzes, modules, and assignments related to your current clerkship. Under the modules tab on Canvas, find your current clerkship and complete the requirements by **the end of the week**, **Friday at 11:59pm**. Each time you enter a new clerkship, you are required to complete the requirements.

<u>Radiology Sessions/Quizzes:</u> Throughout the year, there will be six radiology presentations given during CRISP. After each session, a quiz will open for you to complete. The quiz is due within a week of the session being presented.

<u>Clinical Decision Report</u>: The purpose of writing a Clinical Decision Report for the Journal of Team Hippocrates is to gain experience with evidence-based medicine, primary literature review & scientific writing, and potentially get a publication for your residency application. The Clinical Decision Report is about how to make a clinical decision for a specific patient, using primary literature from clinical trials and applying it to the patient considering their unique clinical social context. In this manuscript, you will introduce a clinical question using a specific patient you follow on your rotation, then attempt to answer your question in the report by surveying the primary literature and apprising one

WAYNE STATE clinical scenario. Your report

will be due at the <u>end of your first 12-week clerkship</u> (whether it's Surgery or Internal Medicine). The official due date is June 29, 2024, and September 28, 2024. Half of the class will submit in July, while the other half will submit in September.

<u>Coach Program:</u> The WSUSOM clerkship coach program aims to support medical student growth and professional identity formation throughout the M3 segment (core clerkships). Clinical coaches will ensure an inclusive learning environment to guide student advancement through guided reflection on clinical performance and feedback; identifying and achieving learning goals; fostering habits of continuousness reflection & professional identity formation, goal setting, and wellbeing.

You are required to meet with your assigned coach once per clerkship and complete the follow up assignment, located on Canvas

<u>EKG Curriculum</u>: Each term, you will practice reading and interpreting EKG's. The curriculum includes 13 modules from the EKG.Academy website. After completing all the modules, you will take a comprehensive quiz, serving as your final grade. There are also optional self-study practice quizzes provided in the module.

<u>Mid-Year Reflection:</u> In this course, several topics will be covered. You will reflect on the knowledge you have acquired through your clerkship experience from the beginning to the mid-point of the year.

<u>Mid-Year Career Planning</u>: At the mid-point of the year, you will reflect on a previous assignment and compare it to the experiences you've had in your clerkship. Assessing your initial thoughts, you will reflect on the career choices you made at the beginning of the year to where you are now.

Course Grading

CRISP is a pass/fail course, meaning a satisfactory (S) or unsatisfactory (I) grade for the course will be determined on the timely completion of the required activities.

<u>Professionalism Expectation</u>: As physicians-in-training, students are expected to demonstrate professional behavior in all community, educational, and clinical settings. Non-adherence to policies and procedures will result in professionalism citations. Multiple citations may result in referral to the WSI SOM Professionalism Committee. Attendance Policy: Attendance is mandatory and will be monitored. Students are expected to maintain an excellent attendance record throughout the duration of their enrollment in the course, attend all clinical activities, teaching conferences, lectures, examinations, CRISP sessions, ect., and report to their conferences attendance respective sites daily.

Clinical responsibilities will sometimes require that students be present on holidays, nights, and weekends. In addition, students may be required to be present at times that conflict with family events and other personal obligations and preferences. All WSUSOM institutional holidays are observed from 5 pm the day before to 5 pm the day of the holiday to accommodate clinical call schedules in the M3 year. Students may be expected to report to clinical duties at 5 pm on the day of the institutional holidays.

The authority to grant or deny an excused absence is the responsibility of the Associate Dean for Student Affairs, and by delegation to the student's counselor. An excused absence does not mean that a student is excused from an activity (examinations and other required activities), but rather the student will be allowed to make-up the activity. Excused absences are granted on the day of the activity and are based upon an unforeseen circumstance preventing the student from participating. All excused absences require appropriate documentation.

Students may take one wellness day each quarter (maximum of four during the clerkship year). Our aim with this policy is to **increase autonomy** for **personal well-being**, while maintaining **professional accountability** as you progress through your medical training. <u>Click here</u> to view more information and submission form.
